







# Collaborative effort ensures smooth sailing for 2025 Ferry2Ferry mini moto event

**EDMONDS, Wash.** – On the sunny morning of Aug. 17, 400 mini motorbikes revved their way onto the Edmonds to Kingston ferry as the Washington State Patrol's Homeland Security Division (HSD) joined forces with Washington State Ferries to facilitate the 13<sup>th</sup> annual transport of riders participating in the annual Ferry2Ferry (F2F) mini moto ride.

The event, one of the Northwest's largest mini moto gatherings, presented unique logistical and safety challenges, given the intricate processes of loading, parking, and off-loading such a large group of motorcycles. The F2F ride spanned over 100 miles throughout Seattle and Kitsap County, including a ferry crossing from Edmonds in the morning and concluding with another ferry journey back to Seattle from Bremerton in the evening.

HSD troopers worked together with ferry staff before and throughout both crossings, ensuring a smooth and uninterrupted experience for the large contingent of motorcyclists and other commuters sharing the vessels. The successful F2F collaboration is a testament to the proactive planning and dedication of individuals like Sergeant Toby Haapala, whose efforts were crucial in orchestrating the seamless execution of this large-scale event.

The partnership between the WSP and Washington State Ferries serves as an example of how effective planning and collaborative effort can overcome complex logistical hurdles, ensuring the smooth operation of significant events and maintaining safety across different modes of transportation.

## WSP DEPLOYS TRACS

The Washington State Patrol will begin enabling TraCS agency-wide between September and December. More than 80 in-person classes will be conducted to aid in the transition.

## PROSECUTOR CORNER

Earlier this month, County prosecutors were emailed a TraCS Access Request form. Prosecutors who currently use the SECTOR system to view/print PDFs of NOI/NOCCs and/or to receive and transmit NOI/NOCCs electronically to the courts and plan to use TraCS will need to complete the TraCS Access Request form to obtain an account. **If you have not yet completed the TraCS Access Request form please email [tracs@wsp.wa.gov](mailto:tracs@wsp.wa.gov) to begin the onboarding process.**
