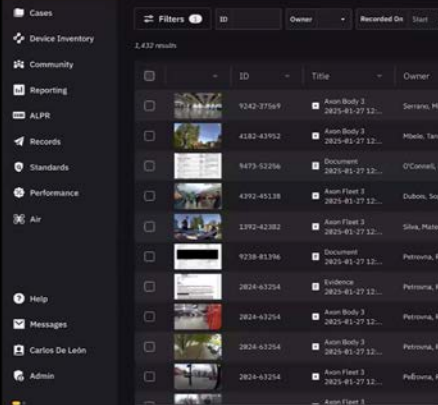

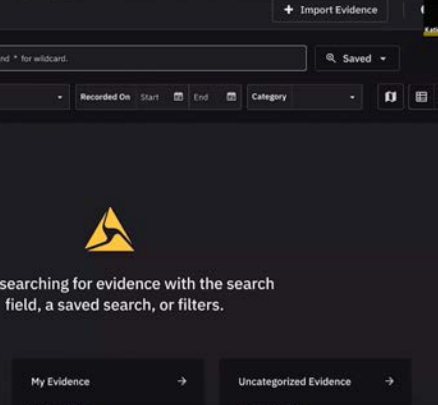

POPS SUSTAINMENT

The Washington State Patrol undertook an assessment of the state of POPS in 2008. As a result of this assessment, Chief John R. Batiste created a POPS Integration Sustainment Committee (PISC) to provide continuing oversight of a variety of POPS-strengthening initiatives.

PASSWORD CHANGES – Washington State Patrol's Information Technology Division (ITD) will update the default Windows password policy to increase the minimum password length from 8 characters to 15 starting on Friday, October 31, 2025 at 5 p.m.

All WSP employees will be required to create Windows passwords that are at least 15 characters long the next time they change or reset their password after this date.

This change is necessary to comply with WaTech's SEC-06-01-S Identification and Authentication Security Standard, which requires all Windows accounts to have a minimum password length of 15 characters not later than January 1, 2026.

This will only apply to Windows passwords that expire after Friday, October 31, 2025 at 5 p.m. All existing Windows passwords will continue to work until they expire or require a reset.
